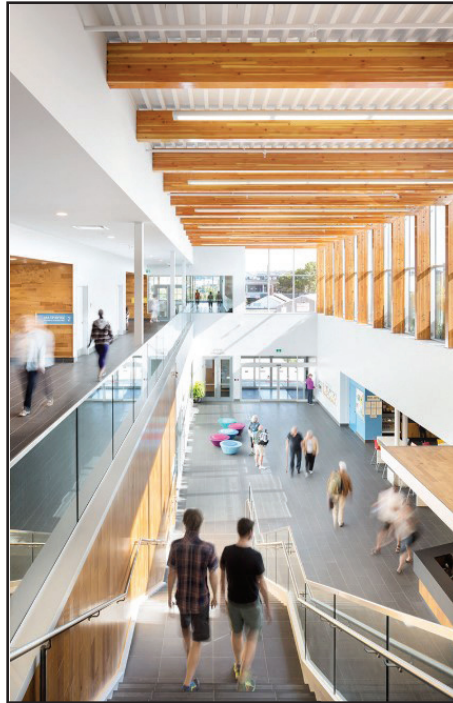

TIMMS COMMUNITY CENTRE

City of Langley, BC



The Timms Community Centre Renewal Project serves as a community and cultural hub where residents can come together to access group activities, health and fitness opportunities, public information and community resources. The project integrated three facilities – Langley City Hall, Fraser Valley Regional Library and Timms Community Centre – into a single, active and inviting civic facility. Timms Community Centre is a state-of-the-art facility that offers a multitude of amenities including a weight room with new cardio equipment, a fitness room with a wooden spring floor, indoor fitness track. It offers programs for youth, seniors, families, new immigrants and persons with disabilities, and also features a gymnasium, games room, and a community kitchen that connects to a multi-purpouse room for entertaining. The facility was designed to optimize energy consumption and makes use of natural lighting as much as possible, while offering residents a healthy indoor environment.

SPICER'S GARDEN PERGOLA

Village of Nakusp, BC



The Village of Nakusp developed a beautiful waterfront promenade along the banks of Upper Arrow Lake. During the development, it became obvious that the existing pergola, known as Spicer's Garden, located on the walkway, needed to be replaced. As Nakusp is a "wood first community", Madden Timber, a local contractor, was awarded the project. Madden Timber's completed pergola, in the Spicer's Garden, complements the beauty along the waterfront promenade and is a favorite attraction for many tourists and locals alike. Madden timber uses fir, which is locally sourced from the Arrow Lakes, and is sawn locally on a band sawmill.

GRANISLE SHORESIDE GAZEBOS

Village of Granisle, BC



Since building the first timber framed gazebo in 2013, council for the Village of Granisle has been dedicated to building with wood and maintaining a timber-frame theme wherever possible. Beautiful pine timber frame structures (one built in 2017 and one in 2018) create two shoreside gazebos, situated on Babine Lake. These gazebos provide opportunities for a broad spectrum of use by the community of Granisle such as family gatherings, community celebrations, weddings and much more. The use of sustainable, durable and locally sourced beetle-affected pine wood is important to projects within the village.
