









- The survey was designed by Public Square in partnership with Campbell Strategies.
- This survey involved a random selection process, with 325 participants.
- Invitations to participate in the survey were sent to over 1700 mayors, reeves, councillors and CAOs, by the Mayor of Ingersoll, Ted Comiskey.
- The survey was in field from April 15 to April 26, 2019.









The majority were unaware that a private waste management company can develop without approval of the local municipal government, and were unaware of the 'demand the right' campaign. But, close to nine in ten support the right to approve new landfill sites in their communities.



Environmental concerns, site location, and financial concerns are top conditions for the approval of a landfill site in municipalities. However, more than four in ten say that they are likely or somewhat likely to approve a landfill site, if their conditions were met.






Overall, how important are the following issues to your municipality?

The Province is currently reviewing municipalities, their governance models, services, and size of councils. Which of the following concerns you the most? Choose your top 3.




Awareness of 'Demand

The majority were unaware that a private waste management company can develop without approval of the local municipal government.



Four in ten are aware of the 'demand the right' campaign to provide municipalities with the authority to make landfill decisions.



Just under three in ten are aware that 80 municipalities have passed a motion to 'demand the right'.




Are you aware that close to 80 municipal governments in Ontario have passed a motion which 'demands the right' to approve new landfills in their communities?





What, if any, would be the most important terms or conditions for approval of a landfill site?






If your municipality was given this right and a private sector operator proposed developing a new landfill site in your community, what, if any, would the most important terms or conditions be for you?





More than four in ten say that they are likely or somewhat likely to approve a landfill site, if their conditions were met.


What would you say is the likelihood of your municipality approving a landfill in your community, if your conditions were met?



Survey Participants




Three quarters of survey participants are councilors, followed by mayors—who are 16% of the sample population.






Roughly half are in either lower or single tier governments.
